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Introduction

Colleges are the anchor points of local communities, supporting individuals of all ages and backgrounds to gain skills and qualifications, helping students unlock their potential, and powering regional economies by delivering the skilled workforce that businesses need.

Our dynamic sector – consisting of 26 colleges across 13 college regions – is the largest skills and training provider in Scotland. Colleges invest in the futures of all students and are significant employers within their respective regions.

As an agile, collaborative, and inclusive national asset, colleges are playing an essential role in nurturing Scotland's economic, social, and

educational recovery – supporting businesses, large and small, to rebuild and re-engage their workforce, maximising employment opportunities for our citizens, and addressing the mental health and wellbeing of our communities.





Response to Covid-19

The last year has been hugely disrupted because of the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic. College leaders and staff have worked incredibly hard to ensure that safety, high quality education, and student welfare have all been protected.

Colleges quickly moved to online delivery and expanded digital capacity to ensure that students could continue learning.



Vulnerable students were offered extra support, including access to devices and data to tackle digital poverty, and were prioritised for the opportunities which existed for in-person learning. In some areas, colleges also supported frontline services by donating PPE equipment, scrubs, healthcare beds and food supplies. Some colleges are being utilised as Covid-19 vaccination centres.

Online learning continues across Scotland and, in line with current public health guidance, some students are back in college campuses to complete practical elements of courses, with safety measures like social distancing in place.

Over 100,000 rapid lateral flow testing kits have been distributed to colleges across Scotland, with twice-weekly voluntary testing being encouraged to support the safe return to learning and teaching on campus.






Hours of Learning




Our Colleges

College Estates

Since 2007, the Scottish Government has invested

over £810m in college capital projects including new campuses and buildings. A further

£300m in

Non-Profit Distributing (NPD) revenue funded investment has also been allocated.

Students require access to innovative state-of-theart learning environments and industry-standard equipment which enhance their learning and prepare them for employment. Many of these campuses now exist, however sustainable investment is required to bring all college estates up to a



minimum standard. In 2017, it was estimated

that £360m is the minimum investment required to bring the sector's existing estate up to an acceptable wind and water-tight condition*.

Colleges have signed up to a **Statement** of Commitment on the Climate **Emergency** which establishes 10 key actions to support Scotland's efforts to achieve net-zero climate emissions by 2045, with Scotland's colleges aiming to achieve net-zero by 2040 or earlier.








