1. UHI Updates

Work on the transformation project continues at pace. A meeting with all AP partners in May has defined the pathfinder projects which will run alongside the main pillars of activity for preparing the full business case (FBC). The aim of the pathfinder projects is to align activities in UHI to make us more effective and efficient. The Engagement report has been prepared and staff are now engaging in focus groups to inform development of the culture and academic affairs aspects of the FBC. Groups are being established to develop both Equalities Impact Assessment and Islands Impact Assessment linked to the project.

2. Update on Student numbers and registry activities (FE/HE)

Applications continue coming in for courses (FE and HE) in AY25/26. At this time of year we process applications and offers multiple times a day. We will shortly be contacting those with places with extra reminders about funding, support and induction details. HE students are able to enrol from 1st July as per UHI processes. We will also be contacting applications who have been offered, and supporting them to complete enrolment ahead of their start.

Enrolment figures for this year are given in the table below. There has been no change in FT enrolments compared to last quarter but an ongoing uplift in part time numbers for both FE and HE. Enrolment numbers for part time FE courses are lower than last year. This is the case across the partnership and is to be expected given the required reduction in credits and the associated mitigations we have put in place.

Our credit target is 3902. As can be seen in the table below we have therefore exceeded the credit target by a small amount. There will be further credits to claim for SVQ and schools provision so the figure will increase slightly by the end of the academic year. We have reduced the activity for which credits are claimed. It is usual for our credit claims to spread across the academic year, unlike many partners who have front loading of their credits. All UHI partners are forecasting to exceed their share of the SFC minimum credit threshold.

Our target for non-controlled FTE is 124.4 but we are currently short of the target at 109.6, up slightly from last quarter (105.8) but still short of the target and will be subject to clawback. Our taught post-graduate FTE is at 8.66, significantly short of the target of 35.

Over 100 Foundation Apprenticeship and Academy students have started in June. Registry and Student Experience worked together to ensure that all students had completed enrolment at their first session across Scalloway, Lerwick and Mareel. This allows a more streamlined process of getting these students moved into the new academic year and allocated their modules with SQA.

The Registry team have processed over 200 applications for the upcoming Skills for Work courses in AY25-26. They have created interview slots with the Student Experience team with all the high schools and junior high schools in Shetland to allow all applicants to have a face-to-face interview. Currently we are receiving the responses to the offers and ensuring we can offer as many places as possible to young people on the reserve list for courses.

The wider student experience team conducted around 200 interviews for the Skills For Work courses across each of the schools. This was done face to face rather than online this year to improve the experience. Interviews covered the range of disciplines. Offer letters have now been sent out to the candidates with most courses filled. There were a small number of unfilled places and those who were not successful in their interviews have been offered to consider taking one of the remaining places. However, the majority of the courses will run this year in their new format with a start date of January 2026.

Registry staff have been working with teaching staff to ensure that framework documents are complete for the courses that will be taught next year so that module entry is accurate and timely, and to ensure that resulting is allocated to the correct lecturer on the UHI system.

Registry staff have also been undertaking end of AY FE progression boards with departments to have a final check of accurate information and who will expect will be continuing next AY so we can accurately enrol them.

Short courses continue to be busy. More dates are being added for upcoming courses which is great for adding to the website, the new Eventbrite and course booking system. The new process allows us to give more information on upcoming courses to customers and provides clearer reporting for ourselves.

Short course income is up to nearly £306k, up £39k from the same point last year. Our target for the year is £350k so we will still need £44k of bookings by the end of July to meet that figure. There are some courses already in the booking system with some spaces already filled. Reaching the target with only a few weeks of classes left may, however, be difficult to achieve.

Our achievement rate for 16-19 is ahead of the government target (70%) as is our overall achievement rate (target 75%) and is in excess of the rates achieved by the central UHI contract.

b. Staff activities & achievements

UHI Shetland were shortlisted in the **Pearson's National Teaching Awards** for the UHI Shetland's School-College Partnership Programme with the Shetland Islands Council. As shortlisted candidates for the bronze award we were invited to meet virtually with judges and staff along with a variety of stakeholders participated in this event. Alongside this Selina worked with Jonathan Butler to produce two short films and a testimonial booklet (attached separately) to support our bid. We have been recognised with a **Silver Award**. We will now go forward to be considered for a Gold Award, which will be announced at a prestigious awards ceremony in London and on BBC One's The One Show later this year.

Dr Rachel Shucksmith has been awarded the title of **Associate Professor of Marine Management** and Governance by the UHI Academic Council. Rachel is the Marine Spatial Planning Manager and she leads on applied research and consultancy projects in marine spatial planning. In collaboration with Shetland Islands Council she has led the development of one of Europe's most advanced regional marine plans and champions the integration of local knowledge and data in marine decision-making.

Shetland Celebration of STEM was attended by our engineering team Howie, Rachel, and Maurice and our STEM Coordinator, Eleanor. This inspiring and fast-paced event was aimed at engaging young people in science, technology, engineering, and maths. The event brought together:

- 13 school groups
- 69 pupils
- 15 teachers and parents
- 28 STEM volunteers, speakers, and judges
- 10 STEM companies
- 117 total attendees (including the Stemovators team)

Our team contributed to a packed day of careers talks, hands-on STEM challenges, judging, and supporting pupil presentations. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive from both teachers and pupils, with 100% of teachers indicating they would recommend the event and attend again

Eleanor Hutcheon and **Saro Saravanan** have completed work on the Seafish project. Part of the final activities on the project has involved Eleanor visiting schools on the mainland to promote the VR activities that were developed as part of the project. Eleanor now moves on to supporting the HIE supported Newton Room programme as part of her role.

UHI Shetland and RSPB Shetland hosted Shetland's Sustainable Seas: Protecting, Managing and Restoring Marine Biodiversity, a free public conference and evening event celebrating and exploring the protection, management, and restoration of Shetland's marine ecosystems on 10th June 2025.

Leo Kelly started as our new apprentice receptionist on 2 June 2025 and two new fisheries research assistants commenced work – **Evie Herrington and Alice Newbould.**

Our **Neuro diversity room** was launched to give space to students from a Neuro diverse background to have a quiet place to eat. We also provided a study space for students in Lerwick on Fridays when the library is shut.

Alison Kilgour collated the results of the CLA survey on copyright for the library.

Rachel Eunson completed EAL Environmental teaching / assessment materials, to be used UHI wide.

Computing team have been active researching cloud server solutions with the UHI ITDI Operations Team and external providers. Final testing stage of a new cloud based public server that all UHI computing staff and students will be using in 2025/26 for Database and Web Development requirements.

Following the successful tender submission we have received an SIC contract for 1 year delivery of SVQ2, 3 & 4 Health & Social Studies; PDA Education Support Assistant; PDA Supervision; CPD Leading & Managing Care. However SIC did not award the following: SVQ Level 7 & 9 Social Services (Children & Young People) – this a huge blow given that we have provided this qualification to SIC for over 15 years, to a very high standard. We have also had excellent external verification reports and glowing feedback from candidates.
